The Outline

Sermon Outline = the skeletal structure. An outline is a guide to keep the speaker focused on the main idea.

The benefit of preaching from an outline:

- 1. Forces the speaker to not read his notes.
- 2. Gives room for the Holy Spirit to interject.
- 3. Writing an outline forces the speaker to connect ideas to each other leading back to the thesis.

In this PDF you will find an example of a sermon written in outline form. Your outline should look exactly like it.

You will also find a blank outline illustrating how each point supports another point eventually leading to the thesis (The big idea). This keeps a sermon focused and deep rather than distracted and wide.

The idea is to listen to a sermon and identify the main ideas in each point. Do not write the entire sermon.
